## **The New Arusha Lutheran Medical Centre Nursing College**

**Establishing a nursing college in northern Tanzania has been a dream for many. With your support this dream will indeed become a reality!**

Tanzania, one of the world's poorest countries, continues to experience a critical shortage of health care personnel making the need to educate Tanzanians at all levels of medical practice paramount. So great is the nursing shortage that only 35 percent of existing positions are currently filled.

- To address this critical shortage, Operation Bootstrap Africa is partnering with Dr. Mark Jacobson, an ELCA medical missionary, and his staff to launch a new nursing college in Arusha, Tanzania. This new nursing college, to be associated with the Arusha Lutheran Medical Center (ALMC), will grant a diploma after three years of study.

Scheduled to open in February 2013, the new college needs to make minor improvements in donated space that will be its home for two years. After two years, the college must find permanent space. An initial class of 25 students will be recruited. Providing scholarships to assist with the high cost of training will be essential. Donated nursing books and teaching materials are currently being




# MGLSS Students are waiting...

**A visit to MGLSS is an unforgettable experience! Judie Lehman of Stoughton, WI, (pictured below with Les Huth, Dr. Seth Msinjili, and Mike Kuehne) traveled with the Wartburg alumni group and shares her experience below:**

“ . . . what has captured my mind and heart is the MaaSAE Girls’ School. Maybe it is my former work (I was a teacher and administrator before retirement). Maybe it is the impression that the headmaster, Dr. Seth Msinjili, had on me personally as well as the rest of our group (he’s a humble man with a great sense of humor who has come out of retirement to lead this incredible school). Possibly, it was interacting with the girls themselves that provided the impetus for me to come home and consider sponsoring a full



scholarship for one of the girls. Or, it could have been that the Holy Spirit truly nudged me to “do something”. Our travel group also decided to donate a full scholarship as a group. One couple had already provided a full scholarship on their own and another had already sent money to OBA. That was how profoundly we had been impacted by what we saw and experienced at the school.

First of all, the peacefulness of the grounds was such a contrast to another school we visited. Secondly, the headmaster and teachers were so delighted that we came and spoke so excitedly about what they were doing. Thirdly, each of us had a student who took us around and showed us various buildings, including their dorms, all of which were meticulously cared for.

We started with a group sharing in the teacher’s lounge where one girl, the student body president, spoke with us. We were able to ask questions of her and she shared that she was going on to college in economics. When someone asked her what she planned do with that degree her response was, “I want to be the first female president of Tanzania.” Wow, talk about high goals!! We were all impressed!

The girls from this school are from “the bush”. We saw on this trip what it was like to live “in the bush”. It is not a part of their culture that girls need to be educated beyond grade 7 (as we know it). These girls at MGLSS are among the brightest and best in that area of Tanzania. It is thrilling to know that they have a chance to better themselves and thus the lives of their families. And, I truly believe that God is nudging us all to contribute to that opportunity through our financial gifts.”

Other recent MGLSS visitors have included a delegation from the ELCA Northern Illinois Synod and members of Lutheran Church of the Holy Spirit, Emmaus, Pennsylvania. A large group of students from Trinity Lutheran College, Everett, WA, spent time at MGLSS in July and several Washington State sponsors attended the September Form 4 graduation.



# MGLSS -- MAKING AN IMPACT

## Eager Students, Dedicated Staff, Committed Sponsors

More than 525 girls have now graduated from Form 4 (Grade 11 equivalent in the U.S.A.) at the MaaSAE Girls' Lutheran Secondary School (MGLSS). Only 8% of all Tanzanian students completed Form 4 in 2011. Among MGLSS graduates, nearly half have received post-secondary education and that percentage is climbing. The incoming students face incredible barriers:

- Coming from cultures where education of girls is not valued and often discouraged
- Coming from families where few members, if any, have attended a secondary school
- Coming from overcrowded primary schools lacking books and other essential teaching materials
- Coming to school with limited English proficiency (usually the students' third language)

The students overcome these barriers and thrive in the learning community of MGLSS. They are focused on their learning and study many hours a day.

In 2011, MaaSAE Girls' Lutheran Secondary School students, at both Forms 4 and 6, achieved exam results that for the first time placed the school in the top 10% of secondary schools in Tanzania.

The academic achievements at MGLSS are also made possible by the committed teaching staff at MGLSS led by Dr. Seth Msinjili. This year at the school:

- More teachers now hold higher degrees in their teaching fields
- Student/teacher ratios are lower than at other secondary schools
- Scores in science have improved with more teachers, books, and equipment to support the science program

In addition, MGLSS support staff provide meals, uniforms, medical assistance, and a safe and secure learning environment.

The commitment of sponsors, along with other donors to MGLSS, must be emphasized. Without them, the amazing story of MGLSS could not be written.

## THE NEED CONTINUES . . .

### For assistance to our partner primary schools

At Olchoki Primary School near Arusha, more than 1800 children crowd into only 14 classrooms. The students in Standards 1 and 2 attend school in two streams a day due to limited classroom space. On a recent visit in January, our OBA travel group was overwhelmed by the sheer number of students in such a small area. We saw the new classroom funded by the Lakes Area Walk donors from Alexandria, MN under construction. It was completed in February (pictured right) and put to immediate use.

This past Christmas season other OBA donors contributed funds for desks for the school. Another need is for textbooks. We observed up to 10 students sharing a single book in the upper level grades. The dedicated headmaster, Michael Mollel, has been partnering with OBA for many years. He said to express his heartfelt thanks to donors who are assisting his school.

# Fiscal Year 2011 Annual Report

## Accomplishments

### Construction and other school projects:

- Working with our Tanzanian partner, Community Development Trust Fund (CDTF), construction was completed on a teachers' office and a second classroom for physically and mentally impaired students at Ilboru Primary School. Funding for more than 150 school desks was sent to furnish new classrooms at Mlimwa Primary in Dodoma, Tanzania. An electrification project was completed at Kiwanja kwa Ndege Primary School in Dodoma.
- A much-needed boys' latrine was completed at the boarding primary school in the village of Ketumbeine, Tanzania
- Construction was completed on a new water pipe which brought mountain water to MaaSAE Girls' Lutheran Secondary School (MGLSS) in Monduli, Tanzania.
- Funding for curriculum books and school uniforms was sent to Bassodawish Primary and Secondary Schools, Tanzania.
- A school well was completed at Ntalawanda Primary School, Tanzania.
- A classroom was completed at Gracious Primary School in Arusha, Tanzania.
- Funding for curriculum books and a milling machine was sent to Moringe Sokoine Secondary School, Monduli, Tanzania.

### Educational Operating Grants and Scholarships:

- The largest program of OBA is the MaaSAE Girls Secondary School (MGLSS) in Monduli, Tanzania. Student sponsorships provided funding for the 275 students to attend this residential school.
- Additional scholarship funds were provided to students attending six other secondary schools in Tanzania.
- In Madagascar, a grant was provided to pay teacher salaries at five primary schools. These teachers taught more than 325 students last year in one of the most impoverished areas of the country.

### Leadership Development:

- The post-secondary program continued its rapid growth. More than 70 MGLSS graduates received full scholarships through OBA to study at vocational schools, colleges and universities in Tanzania. Without these scholarships, students would be unable to train for future professions in education and health care.

### Primary Health Care:

- Funding was given to provide scholarships to train healthcare professionals in northern Tanzania.
- Support was provided to the Mama Naomi Clinic at Selian Hospital in Arusha, Tanzania, to provide basic health services to women and children.
- Funding was provided for the construction of the Plaster House, a rehabilitative center for children recovering from surgery performed at the Arusha Lutheran Medical Center in Arusha, Tanzania.


